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

October-Bridges and Roads

The main subject of your image should be a bridge or a road. "Bridges" are defined as structures, for example a bridge over a river; a picture of the bridge of your nose won't do. All images must be taken within 2 years of the competition meeting.

November-Negative Space

An image where the negative space plays an important role in enhancing the positive space occupied by the subject. The actual subject would occupy a relatively small portion of the frame. Examples include a bland sky as a background to a small cluster of trees far off in the distance, a nondescript wall that emphasizes the colors and form of a passing pedestrian, or a small sailboat floating in a vast body of water on a foggy morning. All images must be taken within 2 years of the competition meeting.

December-Alphabet Soup

The image should represent a letter phonetically or visually. For example, a bee in a photo represents the letter B, sea is for C, a donut can represent an O, a snake an S, and so on. All images must be taken within 2 years of the competition meeting.

2025

January-Geology

The photograph should show a view or vista of mountains, rock formations, landforms resulting from natural weathering and erosion, rock strata, individual rocks or piles of rocks, sand dunes, volcanoes, lava, boiling mud pools, and geysers. Minerals and naturally formed crystals are allowed. Images of gemstones, crystals, rocks or other geological objects that have been modified by humans are not allowed. All images must be taken within 2 years of the competition meeting.

February-Architectural Elements

The photographer must isolate parts of human-made structures (buildings, bridges, etc.) to emphasize architectural elements and their patterns, angles, textures, colors. Creative and interpretative work to create an abstract image from an architectural structure is appropriate. Images of entire structures are not appropriate. All images must be taken within 2 years of the competition meeting.

March-Open-Critique

April-Something Soft

An image of something innately soft (for example a cotton ball) or something captured or rendered to create a sense of softness (for example, a blurred or diffused flower or a baby snuggled in a blanket). All images must be taken within 2 years of the competition meeting.

May-Plants/Flora

An image of wild or cultivated plants such trees, shrubs, grasses, and flowers. Evidence of human activity (people, fences, pots, trees planted in a row, etc.) should be minimal. All images must be taken within 2 years of the competition meeting.

June- End of Year

Important Information about Image Submissions

Starting in September 2024, we will meet in-person for our monthly competitions in the Five Star Residences, our pre-pandemic location. We will also go back to the pre-pandemic categories of the competitions: Digital, Color Prints, and Monochrome Prints. However, there will be one change: you will need to enter the title and a digital file for each of your print entries online as you have been doing for your Digital entries. The deadline to enter prints online will be 11:59pm on the Monday before the competition date; thus different from the deadline for Digital images (11:59pm on the Thursday before the competition) and better aligned with our previous practice for submitting prints. You should bring physical copies of your prints to the meeting as usual. But there will not be a sign up sheet for prints in the room and prints that have not been entered online will not be accepted for the competition.

OctoberJudge: Ronald Peiffer Topic: Bridges and Roads

Ron Peiffer is a Maryland photographer, whose interest in photography has been a lifetime pursuit from film to digital and covers a wide range of subjects. He has been a member of Arundel Camera Club, in Severna Park, since 2011 and is currently rated by the club at the Master's Level in both color and black and white prints, with a platinum certificate in digital images. Ratings are based on club competition performance. Ron has been recognized by Arundel Camera Club as Unlimited Photographer of the Year several times, most recently for the 2023-24 competition year.

Over the last decade, he became increasingly engaged in photography competitions—both judging and competing, to continue his own education in the field. He was trained and certified in judging by MPA and explores both the unusual and mundane subjects, but always looking for emotional impact in subjects and composition. Often, in judging, he looks for the unexpected and for photographs that break all the commonly held rules to achieve impact. He finds competitions and critiques highly instructive for both photographer and judge. Ron serves as a member at large on the Executive Board for the MPA and serves on several organization committees.

October Speaker: R. Andrew Hoff

The Expressive Image - Moving from Landscape Photography to Candid People Photography - R. Andrew Hoff

For over 30 years, my work has centered on landscape and outdoor photography. This program is about my conversion and new passion to photograph people and their social interactions. I will touch on my earlier work in landscape photography and my accidental foray into street photography. I will mention events and certain photographers that have influenced me and my work, as well as the technological advances in cameras that have helped make this conversion easier. The program will explain the reasoning behind this change in my photographic calling, how I have learned from my mistakes and the mental thought process that goes with the images. Most of my current work centers on photographing people that work and attend regional carnivals and fairs. This six-year project has taken me to fairs from Maine to Texas, mostly concentrating on regional fairs and carnivals in NY, MD, VA, and PA. This program will explore the use of emotion and gesture as the heart of the photograph. I will explain and show examples of the Photoshop changes I have made to some of the photographs to enhance the focus on the people. This program of mostly Black and White with some Color photographs and is image driven. I will spend time on "expressive" photographs and the meaning of why photography is more important than just a photograph. I will bring my printed portfolio of images to share in conjunction with the PowerPoint program. This program should last about 75 minutes.

First Place "Azalea Blossoms" By Stan Collyer

I photographed these blossoms in Brookside Gardens with my Canon R6 Model 2, using the camera's automatic focus bracketing feature. It took less than a second to shoot ten images, hand-held. The camera then took about five seconds to merge them into a high-resolution jpg file. It did a good job compensating for slight misalignments due to camera movement. I then darkened the background, except for the leaves that formed an arch behind the blossoms. f/4.5, 105mm, 1/125 sec, ISO 640.




Second Place "Hellebore Blossoms" By Stan Collyer

I bought this Hellebore plant, commonly called Lenten Rose, last winter, and it began blooming in March. I photographed it on my dining room table, with natural light. The wall behind it was gray. It was a simple matter to select the background in Lightroom, and take it all the way to black. I'm hoping for more blossoms next winter! f/6.3, 250mm, 1/30 sec, ISO 400.



Third Place "Flower" By Julian Lewis

This is a photo I took of a flower in my school's courtyard. I thought its color was interesting, and wondered how it would look in black and white, so I decided to take a photo of it. The photo was taken on Tuesday, September 3rd, 2024 at 1:17 PM using my iPhone 15 pro max using the following settings: ISO 125, 24 mm, f2.2, 1/99s.



HM "Zion Canyon" By Gosia Klosek

This image was captured from a half-way point between the bottom and the edge of the canyon. I framed the scene with the shadow cast by the West wall of the canyon, on the bottom of the image. Nikon ISO 400 62 mm f/9 1.400sec

First Place "Stacked Plates" By Gosia Klosek

This is an image of white plates illuminated by 2 sources of light: red from the left and blue from the right. The rims of the plates are (mostly) in brighter light and thus also show yellow. I modified the tone curve profile of the captured image to make the colors stand out and cropped the image to bring the zig-zagging pattern to the center.



Second Place "Three Blossoms" By Stan Collyer

I photographed this orchid in my home, with natural light, using a tripod and focus bracketing. I darkened the background and removed a few imperfections. I've had this plant for a year, and it has bloomed continuously. It was my first orchid, and I'm amazed that I haven't managed to destroy it yet. f/8, 300mm, 1/13 sec, ISO 400.

Advanced Monochrome



First Place "My Fish Dinner" By Dale Lewis

This photo of an eagle, osprey, and fish was taken at Conowingo Dam on 4/21/24 at 8:07 a.m. I saw the eagle and took several pictures. I did not know the osprey until I looked at the photos. My settings: Canon EOS R5 camera, lens (RF 100-500 mm f/4.5-7.1 l, IS, USM), f/ 10, 1/3200 sec, ISO 2500, 700 mm. The photo was edited in Lightroom and Photoshop.



Second Place "Smoke" By Dale Lewis

This photo of smoke was taken on 8/6/24 in my basement at 11:52 p.m. I burnt incense and photographed the smoke. My settings: Canon EOS R5 camera, lens (EF 70-200 mm, f/2.8L, IS, II, USM), f/18, 1/5 sec, ISO 1600, 102 mm. I used four lights (eVOLV 200 Pro) set approximately at 60, 120, 240, and 300 degrees relative to the incense stick. I used a tripod and a black background. The photo was edited in Lightroom and Photoshop.

TIMEPOINTS WINS AGAIN!

"IGPOTY" may not be an acronym familiar to many of our members, but the International Garden Photographer of the Year competitions in the UK are internationally respected. Supported by the Royal Botanic Gardens in Kew, London, the annual series of competitions is open to photographers across the globe, both amateur and professional. IGPOTY attracts thousands of entries and offers the winners both prestige and publicity. The overall event is sub-divided into competitions on specific themes. Each year, particular categories cover topics such as macro, abstract views, the world of fungi, wildlife in the garden, plants and planet, and...botanical still lifes. Multiple awards are given in the following rankings: Top Winners, Finalists, Highly Commended, and Commended. Once the winners in the various categories are selected, IGPOTY presents an exhibition at Kew, along with touring exhibitions that travel within the UK and around the world.

This year, Coriolana Simon (half of the TimePoints Photography duo) won two awards for her floral-themed still lifes at IGPOTY: a Finalist designation and also a Highly Commended.

Meanwhile, Doug Wolters (the other half of TimePoints Photography) has also been winning awards in international competitions. For Canada-based ExhibiZone's on-line show titled "Fall," one of Doug's signature dried "leafscapes" was juried into the exhibit. "Fall" will be available on-line between September 21 and November 21. Another exhibit, sponsored by Gallerium, focuses on the "Unreal." For this on-line exhibit, Doug also had one image juried in, this time an abstract. This month, both Doug and Coriolana have works in a group show at Penn Place Gallery in Garrett Park, MD. Each season, the gallery chooses artists to mount solo exhibits for one month each throughout the year. Doug and Coriolana will present a "duo" exhibit titled "Flora: Two Perspectives," which will showcase flower portraits alongside historically accurate still lifes that incorporate flowers. Penn Place Gallery is holding a group show from September 16 to September 28 that includes one representative work from each artist in this year's Series.
